Since our February Ice Harvest (in what were almost arctic conditions), we've been busy with maintenance and administrative duties— expanding our Board of Directors, refining our guidelines for care and cleaning of artifacts, and establishing an updated archive for artifacts cataloguing. We keep making slow progress in restoring the windows in the brick chicken house and we're accumulating quite a collection of hand tools, garden tools, and related items from generous donors. Orioles on the Farm

The Baltimore oriole is a small type of blackbird of the icterid family, common in eastern North America as a migratory breeding bird. It received its name from the resemblance of the male's colors to those on the coat-of-arms of Lord Baltimore. The song of these



brilliant birds has become a common sound from the highest branches of the trees behind our Summer Kitchen. The farm is home to over 100 species of birds, from the tiny fox sparrow to the majestic bald eagle.
