

Welcome to the Dreibelbis Farm Historical Society



The Historic Dreibelbis Farm has been owned by the Dreibelbis family for over 240 years. The farm, its buildings, and the artifacts of the site are maintained by the Dreibelbis Farm Historical Society, Inc., a registered 501(c)3, nonprofit, charitable organization (EIN: 23-2986673). The mission of the society is to preserve and protect the historic Dreibelbis farm and to make it available to

the public for educational, historical, and environmental purposes. Financial contributions are always welcome and may be deductible for income tax purposes.

The original log house at the farm lasted for almost exactly 100 years. Joel and Elizabeth Dreibelbis replaced it with the present brick structure shortly

after the Civil War. It remains almost completely unchanged from the time of its construction. Our largest public event is the annual Farm Festival usually held on the



fourth Saturday in August. As visitors walk the farm's lanes and land, they'll leave the



modern rush of 21st century society to experience life in the quieter, slower–paced times between the Civil War and America's Great

Depression. Admission is

free; a donation is requested for parking; food is available for purchase. The festival is held rain or shine.



Docents guide tours through the farmhouse (for a small fee). Visitors have a rare opportunity to see the farm's outstanding arrowhead collection.

Why do we do what we do?

We love history. We especially love *living* history! This farm is not only important to the Dreibelbis clan; it's a treasure for our Berks County community.



Because of the ingrained conservatism of the family over the last three centuries, the house and buildings have remained virtually unchanged. This site is a wondrous example of living history and historic conservancy. We want to protect the farm from future development, preserve the historical resources of the site, and enhance the ecological value of wetlands and endangered species habitat onsite. Our non-profit corporation was founded to make the resources of the farm available to the public. We look forward to working with new volunteers and contributors!

The Historic Dreibelbis Farm is located south of the village of Virginville along Rte. 143 in Berks County. Demonstrators display the rural skills and arts necessary to keep an intact farmstead thriving: spinning, butchering, buttermaking, chair caning, barrel-making, and sauerkraut-making. Children enjoy making hand-dipped candles, wooden bird houses, or even trying some games that were popular for kids back at the time of the American Civil War. And there's a hayride, too!

Restoration

Work continues on the brick chicken house to restore and develop it into a museum display area and multi-purpose building

for historical workshops and meetings. This big task involves digging down to allow wood flooring to be installed. The windows are being totally refinished/rebuilt.





Roof insulation, electricity, and heating and air conditioning will complete the project. Future projects include reroofing the ice house,

recreating a stone bake oven, erecting a pig stable, and rebuilding a sagging wall in the butcher house.

Perhaps the biggest restoration project was a three year, all volunteer barn-roofing job to eliminate the dozens and dozens of leaks caused by the winds of Hurricane Sandy.

Some of our Programs and Activities

- **February:** Ice making on the farm. This includes a demonstration of how ice was harvested and stored, and why this was important to early farm life.
- **Spring:** The "Peeper Walk" an evening trek to a large vernal pool to meet some of the thousands of the farm's tiny frogs.
- Early Summer: Wildflower Walk. A local botanist leads a walk through the wetlands.
- August: Annual Farm Festival. Demonstration of crafts and techniques of Pennsylvania German 18th and 19th Century farm life with tours of the historic house.
- **October/November**: Fall Family Fun is our family-oriented activity which often includes an opportunity for paranormal investigation.
